Major General Michael Jeffery visits Wiluna

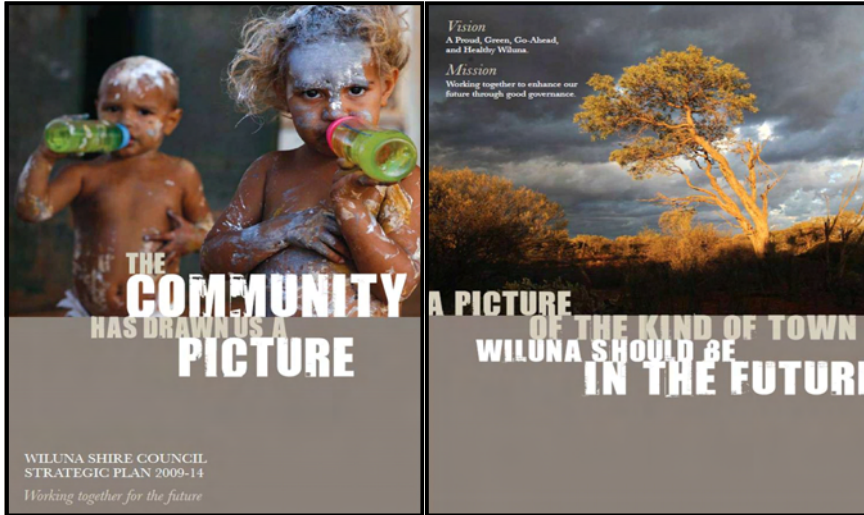

Wiluna Shire Council Strategic Plan 2009 - 14

BHP Billiton–Yeelirrie Project

Current Status

BHPb are currently in the pre-feasibility stage of the project, with work focused on upgrading the status of the Yeelirrie deposit to declare a mineral resource. There are about 40 people on site involved in this drilling program, and in a range of environmental studies which are being undertaken as part of the environmental impact assessment process.

Community visits

Since commencing the community consultation program in May, BHPb's community consultation team has visited Wiluna, Lenora, Menzies and Kalgoorlie-Boulder to discuss the project with

community members and local governments. A range of queries have been raised, covering topics such as the mining process, project time frame, transportation, environment, radiation, workforce and contract opportunities. BHPb has a range of information sheets available on these topics. You can find out more by contacting Carolyn Walker on 9450 1445.

Community Reference Group

The community reference group (CRG) met in August and September. It will play a key role in enhancing communication and consultation for the project. At the September meeting, the CRG heard about radiation from guest

speaker Jim Hondros, who is a Member of the Australian Radiation Protection Society and Environmental Institute of Australia. His presentation focused on various aspects of radiation and Uranium, including sources, exposures, health effects, controls and regulations.

Meeting Henry Ward and Stan Gratte

The Shire CEO and Tourism Officer were in Geraldton on the long weekend and met with Henry Ward and Stan Gratte. Henry Ward is a Pastoralist from Glen-Ayle station in Wiluna Shire. His family have been there since the early 1900s. Henry can tell many a story about his life and station work; which he did. Henry turned 90 this

year. Stan Gratte told many stories including the adventure he and Mudjon and his searching party had when looking for and bringing in Warri and Yatungka from the bush for the first time. He also showed never before seen footage, outside of his immediate family, of when his search party first met

Ben Brown and his family. It was a great honor to meet these two wonderful men who have so much knowledge of Wiluna.



Curtin Academics Visit to Wiluna

Recently 21 senior academic staff from Curtin University in Perth, and three staff from the Combined Universities Centre for Rural Health in Geraldton, visited Wiluna. One main aim of the program was to help university lecturers learn more about Aboriginal culture and remote health so they have a better understanding to pass on to staff and students studying in health careers. For many participants it was a first time experience going to a remote town. One of the many highlights was the opportunity to spend time with families from Bondini, Windidda, Kutkabubba and Ullula. Curtin university Professor Lorna Rosenwax summed up her thoughts, "Wiluna was an amazing experience in many ways. I can't believe that one minute I was in an Aboriginal community sitting in the dust, swatting flies, preparing damper and being included so generously into a family activity - and then hours later I was back in Perth doing my emails. I feel like I've been through a very special, time/place warp". Over the three days they spoke to many Wiluna people, as well as

organizations such as the school, DCP, Shire, Police and NAHS.

All of the academics and staff wish to express their thanks to people and families in Wiluna who participated in the program and also acknowledge the support of the Shire, NAHS, Police, DCP, school, and BHP Billiton at Mount Keith's operations who provided the flight back to Perth.



Bondini Road Closure

The Wiluna back track has been closed due to a number of reasons;

The safety concerns as drivers are not licenced and vehicles being used were not road worthy. Those persons using the back track without being licenced or using unlicenced vehicles were not covered by Third Party insurance and were at risk of facing large bills if involved in an accident.

Vehicles using the main road were getting confused as vehicles were approaching them on the wrong side of the road whilst using the back track.

There were a number of people using the back track continuously when they were drunk, creating a major safety issue.

Use of the back track to enter town also required driving on town roads to access services.

Wiluna Police are fully supportive of every person in Wiluna obtaining a drivers licence. There are a number of options available including obtaining an extra-ordinary drivers licence. Police will assist everyone to obtain a licence, we have access to a driver training vehicle for training and driving tests, we can run a short course on road rules and obtaining a licence tailored to the individual needs. Let us know at the station of your interest.

Please come into the Police Station and see Shelley or one of the Police Officers

who will provide accurate advise on the current status of your drivers licence and what steps you need to take to obtain your licence.

Remember that you can pay your fines off with a small payment each fortnight and as soon as you organise the payments, the fines suspension will be lifted allowing you to a) drive if you are licenced or b) apply for your licence if not.

Big Aussie Swap Meet

On Friday 13 November, 2009, there will be a community swap meet. The 'Big Aussie Swap Meet' is part of celebrating National Recycling Week with Planet Ark. Everyone in the community are invited to participate in the event.

People need to bring one to five good items that they no longer want and are given one token for each item. The item/s are then placed on a table. During this time people can browse at the items but not buy them. Once everyone has received a token for their items, people can exchange their token for an item of their choice. Should more than one person want to have the same item, they are then encouraged to play scissors, paper, rocks to win the right to buy the item with their token. There is no money involved in this fun filled swap meet. Its about recycling our goods that we don't want anymore. The Shire supports this activity in accordance with the "Green Wiluna" strategy in the 2009-2014 Strategic Plan.



On Saturday 19 September 2009 an investigative party from members of the Wiluna Volatile Substance Use Action Group travelled by road to Ilpurla in the Northern Territory, returning to Wiluna on Friday 25 September 2009. The travelling group consisted of a representative from WAPS, NAHS, Ed Dept, DCP, Apex Mine & ABC Journalist; community members from Wiluna were invited and encouraged to attend, however, at this point in time and for various reasons were unable to accompany the group.

The purpose of the trip was to Firstly: ascertain whether Ilpurla NT could be a suitable option for Wiluna VSU users and their families when considering individual circumstances/needs. Secondly: the appropriateness or otherwise of Wiluna VSU users attending Ilpurla NT for rehabilitation purposes without infringing on cultural, customary, spiritual and family identity & values. Thirdly: whether the Ilpurla NT model could be replicated here in the lands of the Martu people.

It was also important for the travelling group to gain an understanding of how other communities experiencing VSU dealt with this issue first hand and therefore informal meetings with some agency representatives enroute at Warburton,

Trip to Ilpurla

Ngaanyatjarra-Giles (Warakurna) & Docker River were subsequently held.

Ilpurla is located 1278kms east of Wiluna, over 200kms south west of Alice Springs and is owned and operated by Mr Barry Abbott with the assistance of family members most notably his wife and grandson. Given its remoteness access to Ilpurla is by high clearance 4wd only and when accessed was surprisingly well resourced and appeared to be an adequately funded modern facility comprising excellent accommodation for both VSU clients and workers. It soon became apparent to the travelling group that Barry Abbott is a well known and highly regarded individual with a strong history in supporting VSU users and it must be mentioned that the Ilpurla facility is recognised by the NT Government as an "alternative to detention" for young offenders subject to VSU and finding themselves in the justice system with some current clients spoken to there subject to court orders.

Ilpurla is all encompassing and will accept VSU users without favour and avails itself to those presenting with or without court based orders and Australia wide. It is not restricted to Aboriginal clients and in fact encourages non Aboriginal clients to participate in its unique rehabilitation service with the goal of moving those clients from chronic to reformed users before returning to their respective home lands wherever that may be.

Although he has lost count Barry Abbott guesstimated about 600 youth have come and gone over the years coupled with a 75%



success rate. Surely this is testament to the theory that one person can not only make a difference but can make a lot of difference.

(The writer directs those interested on hearing about the Ilpurla NT story to access recent interviews conducted that have been captured on the ABC radio web site.)

Fortunately the communities mentioned above are not experiencing the same type/quantum of VSU users currently in Wiluna, although each are coming to terms with fluctuating petrol sniffing and have chosen to either increase diversionary programs (Warburton), collective community "zero tolerance" (Docker River) and the use of a facility in Alice Springs (Warakurna).

As we all know accessing some services in rural and remote WA can be difficult requiring in some instances the need to travel afar. Ilpurla NT is certainly a long way from Wiluna, however, it may be considered upon further investigation by affected individuals to be the closest to their needs and they should be supported if and when those decisions are ever made.

In conclusion, should the Martu people feel that an Ilpurla NT type rehabilitation facility be constructed in their lands, then this should be vigorously pursued and I for one will assist where possible.

International Cricket held at Bondini



National Child Protection Week (NAPCAN) got off to a flying start in Wiluna where the inaugural "Scotland v Australia" cricket match was held at the Bondini Aboriginal Community. The focus of the event being Communication - Interaction - Participation.

Approximately 75 people attended Bondini to be part of and witness this historical event, 40 of whom participated, majority being children.

War paint duly applied, the Scots were sent into bat and faced fierce bowling from the Aussies and at the conclusion of 20 overs they achieved 120 runs for the loss of a mere 10 wickets, after which refreshments were swiftly consumed and the Aussies sent into bat.



Unfortunately the Australian team were not up to the attack of the Scottish bowlers and although try as hard as they could, achieved a gallant 95 runs for the loss of 14 wickets.

A brilliant day was complete when everyone including spectators sat down for a scrumptious BBQ lunch and to rehash some of the memorable moments of the game.



The scene was set for the return leg at Bondini Community on Sunday 13 September where the Scottish cricket team won the game on the day.

Community Uranium Meeting

On Thursday, 30 October, 2009 a community meeting was held at the Shire Training Room to discuss uranium mining. A community BBQ followed.

Over 50 people attended the meeting including 12 Martu community members.

Representatives from BHP Billiton, Mega Uranium, and Toro Energy presented to the community and answered many community concerns.

Darren Farmer asked that the companies remember that the Martu people have a close cultural connection to 'Country' and requested that the companies convince the community that Uranium mining is safe culturally and environmentally.

Presenters assured the community that local bush tucker would not be affected. The companies indicated that there will be future consultations with the local community to determine the Martu

cultural values.

Darren also suggested that the mines need to have a united approach and work together. All presenters agreed that this process was vital for the companies to have a united front on Uranium mining.

There was discussion about the need for better understanding and awareness from agencies about how culture works in

of cultural matters, overcrowding of houses, kids going to school and counselling for those that need it".

Regina Ashwin asked "that agencies come out to the community and see us, sit down and have a yarn and find out what really is going on in the community."

Mr Kenny Farmer supported Regina's statement by claiming that the employment agencies "need to get to know what people want and to see people face to face, really talk to Martu people."

Delvene Patch said that "we need to be encouraging our youth, getting them to be part of this group, so the young people can be part of the decision making for them and their community. By involving the youth, the youth can get confidence in themselves."

Everyone in the community is invited to attend these meetings.

Wiluna Enchanted Masked Ball

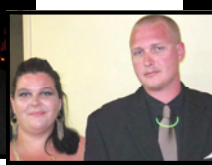
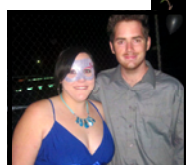
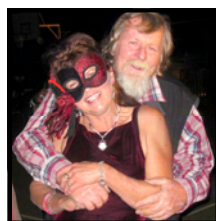
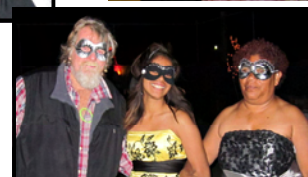

Repairs done on Pool

There were repairs carried out on the swimming pool over the last few months, the pool had been losing a lot of water. After investigation, workmen were hired to repair a broken pipe and holes found on the lino flooring. The holes on the lino floor of the pool were made from rocks being thrown into the pool. The Shire paid just over \$10,000 to repair the pool. We ask that the community

inform children that any rocks thrown into the pool may mean the closure of the pool. Repairs were also made to the shade cloth that hangs over the toddlers pool. The damaged was caused by people hanging from the shade cloth breaking the shackles and tearing the cloth. The shade cloth has been fixed and erected over the toddlers pool.
