CEO's Report

Council has adopted its 2017/18 Annual Budget which contains the following exciting major projects:

- Renovation of the old Club Hotel Wiluna which includes a Function Centre,
- Upgrade of the main street,
- Construction of five residential houses, and
- Planning and design of the Wiluna Caravan Park renovations.

The Shire is also in discussion with Blackham Resources to allow the general public access to Lake Violet.

The Shire is planning to hold a public auction to sell off a number of excess plant and equipment. The auction should be held in the next couple of months down at the Shire Depot. Items that will be sold includes:

Grader,

Tractor,

Roller.

Caravan.

Large Shed, and

Sundry Equipment and Furniture.

Further information about this auction will be provided shortly.

Local Government Elections will be held on Saturday 21 October 2017 across Western Australia. Council had resolved to hold the Shire of Wiluna's election by way of a postal election which will be run by the WA Electoral Commission. The Shire will have four Councillor positions up for election, with three positions having a four-year term while the remaining position has a two-year term.



Vincent Catania MLA Member for North West Central August 4, 2017

Catania demands that Aviation Inquiry visits Gascoyne and Midwest towns

The local Member for North West Central and Nationals WA Transport spokesperson Vince Catania has welcomed a Parliamentary inquiry undertaken by the Economics and Industry Standing Committee into regional aviation services and the exorbitant prices that regional users are forced to pay.

Mr Catania is urging residents and all local governments to attend the public hearings being held in Kununurra, Broome, Karratha, Kalgoorlie, Esperance and Albany.

"In the lead up to the recent State election the Nationals WA highlighted the need for an inquiry into regional air travel, specifically looking at the unaffordable costs that regional users have to endure," Mr Catania said.

"Nothing has been done to put downward pressure on ticket prices or to ensure that there is better connectivity across the regions. This is also stifling investment into tourism across the state."

Mr Catania said "I am also concerned that a Committee dominated by Perth-based members will just be paying lip service to regions users by holding meetings in large regional centres and will not consider visiting smaller communities like Carnarvon, Exmouth, Onslow and Shark Bay that face more serious impacts of a distorted aviation service."

Mr Catania said that small regional communities like Meekatharra, Mount Magnet and Wiluna also need to be able to tell the Committee of the constraints to building local, isolated economies when regional aviation is either not offered or is far too expensive to be utilised.

"Regional areas vary considerably in their tourism resources and the complex social and economic demographics that provide their uniqueness. But the one thing they all share is their common need for accessible, reliable and affordable airline services that also delivery a quality experience to the user. They are also essential to the social well-being of these regional communities," Mr Catania said.

"Tourism is a growing sector across WA which will undoubtedly provide opportunities for establishment of new small businesses and expansion of existing ones, which will provide more employment and sustainability of regional communities and attractions."

"Airline services underpin the viability of our regional communities and their ability to compete with interstate and international attractions."

The Commission has developed an online system called Nomination Builder to assist candidates to complete their nomination form which includes the candidate profile. This is the preferred method of completing the nomination form and profile for elections conducted by the Commission. Candidates complete their nomination details and profile, print the completed form which has a reference number allocated and lodge it with the Returning Officer. The nomination builder can be accessed at elections.wa.gov.au

Where an agent lodges a nomination on a candidate's behalf, it must be in the prescribed form with a written authorisation signed by the candidate.



Wiluna and Water

Mining in Wiluna reached its peak when other great names in gold production, Big Bell, Peak Hill and Lawlers, to name but a few—had almost ceased to be. The two most important factors other than available finance were the new "oil flotation" processing and an abundant supply of water. It was not until 1929 that water in any great quantity was sought. For both town and mine, a supply of 1,000,000 gallons per day was required, 3/4 of this being used at the mine. Bores were sunk by the Wiluna Gold Mines Ltd, east of the mine and 4 miles east of the town. These bores indicated that there was a substantial subterranean river bed. Ten wells five feet by four and approximately 35' deep were sunk. The water level was approximately 12 feet below ground level. These wells drained 547 sq miles of catchment area. For the town, two six inch mains carried the water from the electrically operated pumps to eight 30,000 gallon tanks situated on a rise about a mile east of the town. One ten inch main carried the water to the town, where a pressure of 70 p.s.i. has been tested. With such a water supply "grass lawns, vegetable gardens and fruit trees, except stone fruit, flourished".

In the early days many of the mine workers built their homes along the pipeline. When they required water they simply punched a hole in the pipe, drew off the water they wanted, and then plugged the hold ready for future use.

It is obvious that such a water supply must have a substantial beginning. Assuming that there is an annual rainfall of 980 points, then of the 76,580,000,000 gallons, approximately 25,000,000,000 gallons would be absorbed and stored in the basin annualy. This could account for the fact that over a period of 13 years, the continual withdrawal of 365,000,000 gallons each year made no significant impression upon the level of the water table.

This water is still being used, and after 35 years, no noticeable injury has been caused to plant life. On analysis, the water was found to contain 49 grains of total salts per gallon. Mr. H.H. Carroll, General Manager for W.G.M. in 1951, reported that

"once during the active life of the mine when the draw from these wells was 500,000 gallons a day the electric pump had to be lifted four feet on account of the gradual rising of the water table some months after heavy rain had fallen to the north".

Plaistowe and Co., when treating wells on their property seven miles east of Wiluna, checked several at 3,600 gallons per hour. The greatest supply ws 115,000 gallons pumped in 24 hours of continuous pumping. Seven days of continuous pumping test did not appreciably lower the level.

Almost 1,000km north-east of Perth, Wiluna Remote Community School has been named as a finalist for the WA Excellence in Aboriginal Education award.

School principal Adriano Truscott is also a finalist for the WA Primary Principal of the Year award and said the school's success was down to its collaboration with the Wiluna Community.

"We have six classroom teachers and six local teachers—our local teachers are local Martu or other Aboriginal residents from Wiluna," he said.

"We try to make sure there is a cultural balance in the school, we are a very inclusive school, and I suppose one of our core strengths is having a strong local presence within the school."

Mr Truscott said the school had 85 students from a range of backgrounds including the traditional owners of Wiluna, the Martu community, the Ngaanyatjarraku lands, and a small group of Fijian and Tongan pupils.

He said Aboriginal language and culture was the focal point of education at the school, engaging students in a way so they could understand the WA curriculum.

"If we are looking to inspire and create bi-cultural students who can really work in their own culture and then work in Perth and other cities, then students understanding who they are and their identity first is really the most important thing,' he said. "From that we can bridge further learning that is going to help them in the bigger world. The language and cultural aspect is one of our priorities, as well as good health, attendance and really it is about learning two ways, the children are strong in who they are in their own cultural knowledge and language but they are also strong in their western culture and language, which we bring to them."

The school uses a cultural calendar formed by locals and families, which gives an idea of the people, plant, animal and weather events happening in the region.

Mr Truscott said by bringing families on board, the community engaged more with education and a joint responsibility was created.

"We take a lot of learning to country, which means going out on bush excursions, to water holes and places around the school where they can take that learning and do it practically," he said.

"It is great, you can see such a change and the important thing as well is that we can include families, and so there is a transparency to what we are doing, there is inclusivity to what we are doing and there is a collaboration around it which makes it really strong."

Mr Truscott found his way to Wiluna after an Aboriginal elder, who was his mentor at the time, introduced him to his family in the town. Originally and ESL teacher, he said he was humbled to be named a finalist for Primary Principal of the Year, an accolade that would reflect his team and community.


