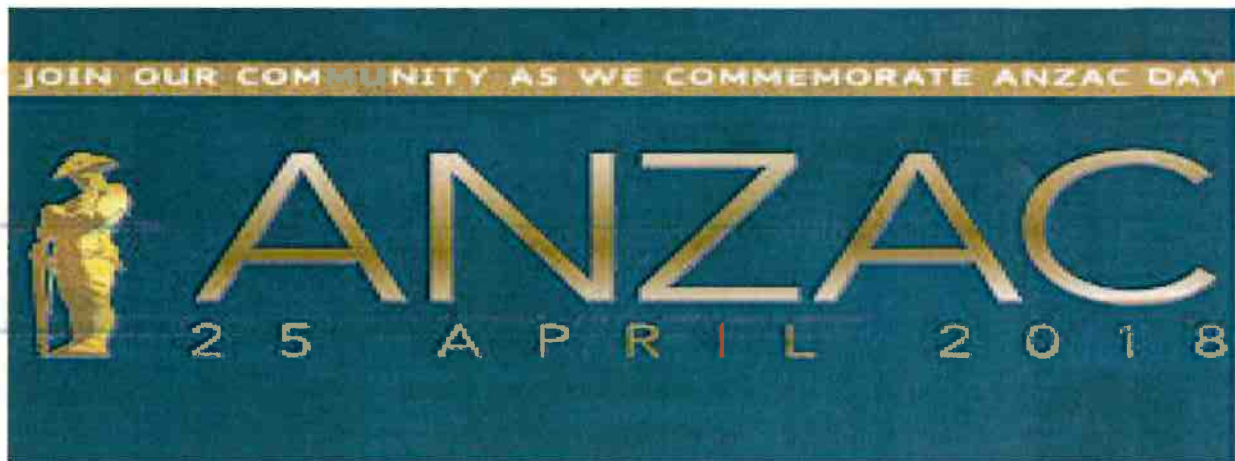

CEO's Monthly Report

In last month's community engagement, the Wiluna Public Swimming Pool was identified as the most significant community facility the Shire operates. As the Shire had made some recent changes to the management of the Wiluna Public Swimming Pool, I will take the opportunity to explain the reasons for these changes. Belgravia Leisure was appointed for three years to manage the pool facility which was a departure from the Shire employing its own staff to undertake this task.

There were a number of reasons why the Shire is outsourcing the management of the Wiluna Public Swimming Pool which included:

- Easier access to specialised staff and professional services,
 - A greater level of career development for the pool operator,
 - Provide more activities/events at the pool, and
- Allows the Shire to focus on other services and infrastructure areas.

Belgravia Leisure was able to bring a pool lifeguard to Wiluna for a week each month during the season, which allowed them to operate more regularly inflatable pool toys and organise additional activities. During this season, there were 4,600 uses of the pool facilities.

The Shire will be undertaking some works on the Wiluna swimming Pool facility over the offseason to ensure it remains the Shire premium recreational facility.

The recent education campaign in relation to the management and welfare of dogs and cats in Wiluna was very successful. The Shire's contract rangers provide the Wiluna community with a number of additional services including tick treatments, microchipping, de-sexing, rehoming etc. As a result, dog registration had also increased by 150%. Two of the de-sexed dogs will be returning to Wiluna next week when the contract ranger returns to Wiluna.

The Shire has engaged the services of Tamihana Cummings in the position of Recreation and Leisure Coordination. He will be commencing his new position in Wiluna on Monday 9 April 2018. This position will be responsible for organising community events and activities as well as recreational programs.

Put in your calendar, the annual ANZAC Day dawn service which will be held outside of the Shire's newly renovated Heritage & Interpretation Centre on the 25 April 2018. All residents and visitors to Wiluna are welcome to attend this important annual event

School's calendar program wins award

Wiluna Remote Community School has won the nationwide School Award in the Indigenous Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics Awards announced at a ceremony in Wiluna yesterday.

Delivered by the Commonwealth Scientific and Industrial Research Organisation, the \$10,000 award recognised the engagement of the school with the Martu rangers and the wider community in using traditional knowledge to teach science.

School principal Adriano Truscott said the award celebrated a wider community collaboration. "The model is based on a two-way approach where we are saying there is Martu knowledge and there is Western knowledge and they both are incredibly important so we are putting them on an even platform," he said.

"It's about continuing culture, it's about becoming a stronger community and you become a stronger community by being strong in your language and your culture."

Mr Truscott said the medium for the delivery of the educational program was two-way science working with Martu and non-Martu educators.

"Through talks in time, we have actually come up with what is the beginning of a Martu curriculum which we call the Martu Calendar," he said.

"The Martu Calendar looks at people, plants, the weather and animals. It looks at what is happening throughout the year in those areas.

"What we do as a school is connect what is in the science curriculum in the West Australian curriculum to that."

CSIRO co-ordinator of science pathways for Aboriginal communities David Broun said he saw the Martu Calendar informing the learning at the school as an innovation. "I think the two things that stand out are the depth and engagement of the school with the Martu community," he said. "The elders are comfortable with walking into the school, walking into the staffroom and know that what they say is respected, understood and included in the student-learning program.

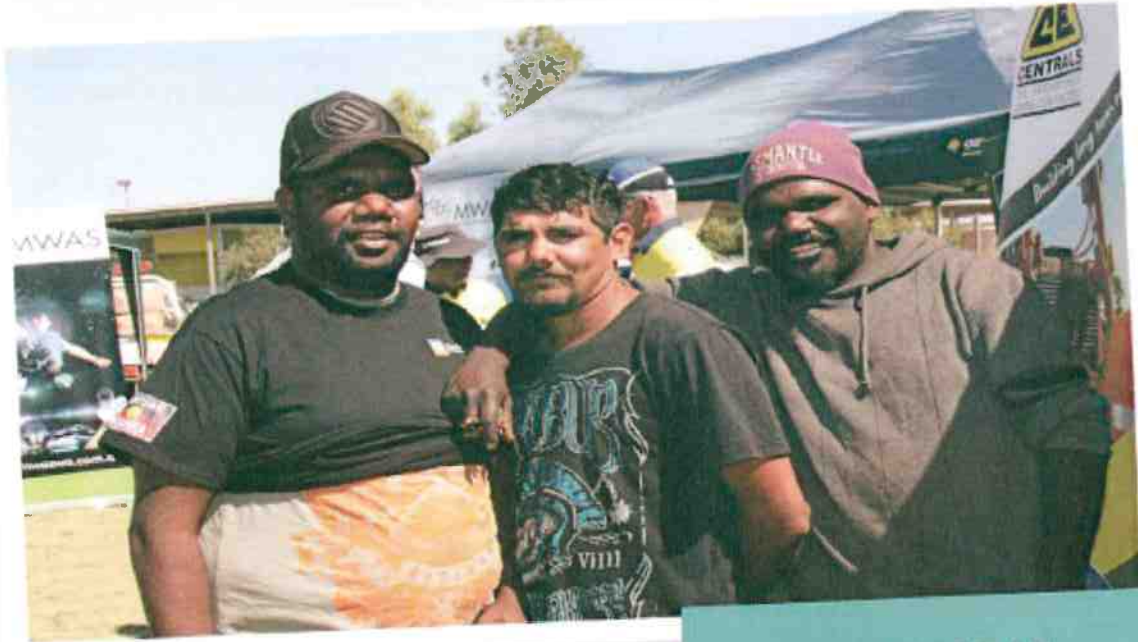
"That engagement extends out to ranger programs, visiting scientists, the Department of Biodiversity and Attractions and other schools."

Although science is the main connection, Mr Truscott said there was a strong overlap with humanities and social sciences.

CSIRO indigenous STEM education project director Therese Postma said Wiluna Remote Community School was an outstanding example of a community pulling together to teach two-way science in an indigenous context.

Catania calls for Government's response on airfare inquiry 16 March 2018

The Nationals WA transport and tourism spokesman Vince Catania is calling for the State Government to respond to an inquiry into regional airfares that was tabled in Parliament almost four months ago.

Mr Catania, whose North West Central electorate takes in tourism hotspots Exmouth and the Coral Coast, said there was no chance overpriced airfares would change unless the Government pulled its socks up and responded.

"We need the Government to take action and re-regulate the aviation industry if it is to pull the State out of its tourism slump," he said.

"Such high prices elicited by a virtual duopoly dominating air travel options in regional WA is turning our tourism industry stale and making it unaffordable for regional residents to access this aviation services."

Mr Catania said the Government needed to get serious about re-regulating the aviation industry, starting with a response to the Economics and Industry Standing Committee's report that was tabled on 30 November 2017.

His call comes off the back of fresh figures released by Tourism Research Australia this week showing WA's International visitation and spend continued to decline in 2017.

In the year to December 2017 WA's share of visitors dropped 1 per cent to 946,000 and their cumulative spend of \$2.3 billion was down 5 per cent.

Meanwhile Tasmania enjoyed a surge in visitors over the same period, up 18 per cent while spending spiked by 32 per cent.

Mr Catania said the downward trend of international visitors heading to regional WA was partly to blame on unreasonable domestic and regional airfares.

"With recent trends showing international visitors' propensity to disperse into regions has declined, the State Government needs to urgently address cost prohibitive factors stifling our tourism trade," he said.

"The outrageous cost of air travel to regional WA is without doubt one of the key factors influencing tourist's decision to stay put rather than explore our beautiful regions."

"Regional aviation needs to be treated as an essential service, one the State Government plays a crucial role in ensuring remains affordable and accessible."

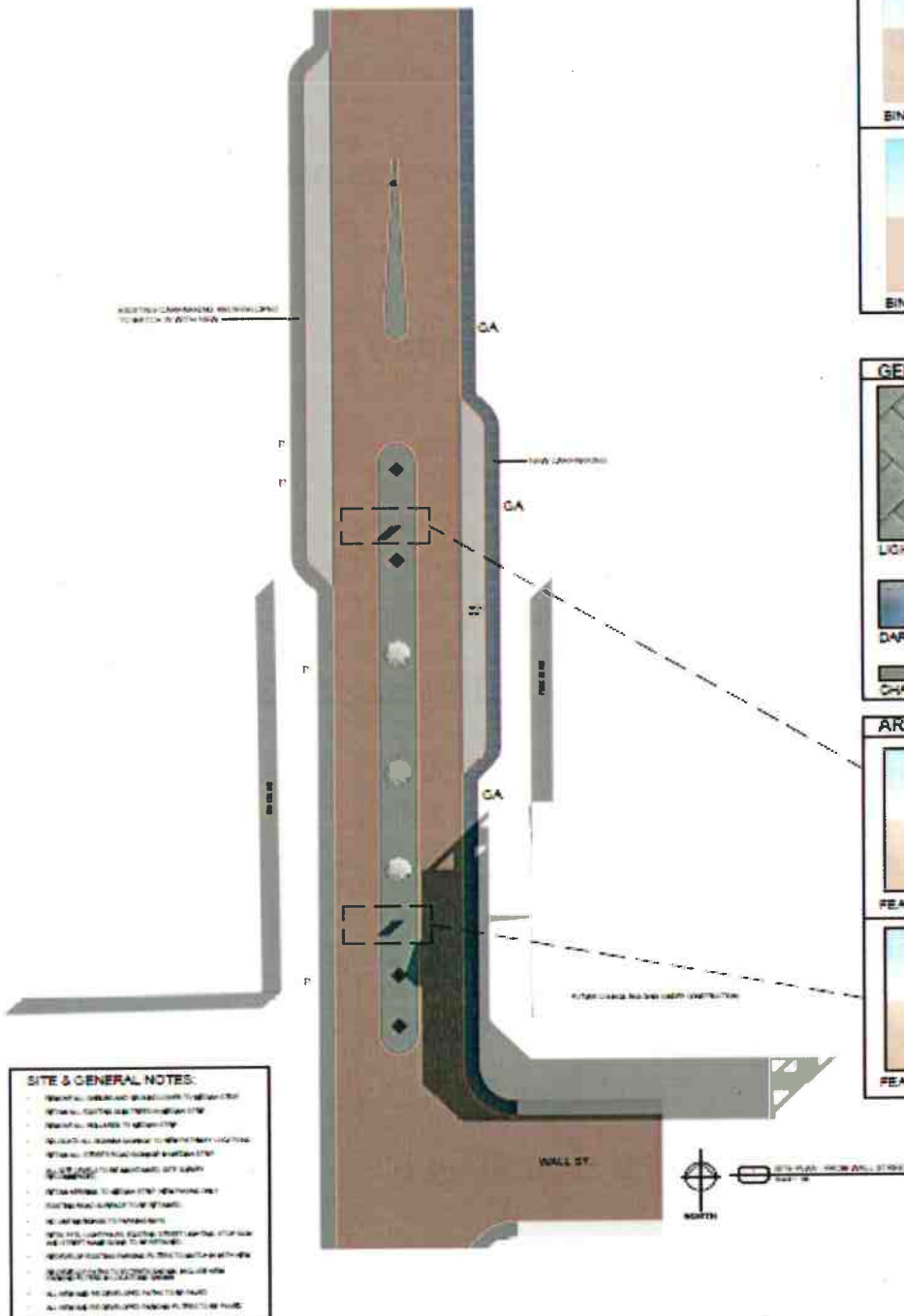

A day in the life at Wiluna Remote Community School.

At Wiluna RCS, our day is built upon growing successful learners.

8am	Gates open.	<p><i>Attending school every day is very important for the learning of every student.</i></p> <p>Pendragon Buses provide our bus service that picks up/drops off students from/at Bondini and Kutkabubba.</p>
8-815am	Breakfast time	<p><i>Children who eat healthy food are better learners.</i></p> <p>We have a Healthy Eating policy that requires that students eat healthily, so we ask that foods and drinks high in sugar and fat are not brought into the school. High sugar drinks includes Orange C, juice boxes and all cool drinks.</p> <p>Northern Star generously support the school with its Healthy Food program. We provide students with Weetbix.</p>
8.25-8.45am	Morning fitness.	<p><i>Children who exercise regularly learn more.</i></p> <p>This time allows the school to get an hour of organised physical fitness activities for the whole school every week.</p>
8.45-10.30am	Whole school literacy	<p><i>Our students are learning literacy skills that will help them for the rest of their life.</i></p> <p>Every class, every day runs the Wiluna Literacy Strategy. This includes research-based programs and strategies to develop Standard Australian English reading, writing and speaking skills. We use the Letters and Sounds program, which is based on internationally acclaimed research to ensure effective literacy development.</p>
10.30-10.40	Healthy Eating/Recess	<p><i>Learning takes lots of energy, so healthy eating at recess is important.</i></p> <p>Northern Star generously support the school with its Healthy Food program. We provide hot and healthy meals to students at recess because they need the energy for the day.</p>
11:00-12pm	Whole school numeracy	<p><i>Our students are learning numeracy skills that will help them for the rest of their life.</i></p> <p>Every class, at least 4 days a week, runs numeracy (maths) classes, following the West Australian Curriculum. Maths is also practised in science and cooking classes.</p>
12pm-12:10pm	Crunch and Sip	<p><i>Talking together, water and snacks are fuel for learning.</i></p> <p>This is a dedicated time for students to eat vegetables and fruit and spend positive talking time together.</p>
12:10-1pm	Other subject	<p><i>Our children learn about Wiluna and the world beyond so that they can be successful.</i></p> <p>This time is used for Science or Humanities and Social Sciences (alternate terms).</p>

1-1:30pm	Lunch time	<p><i>Learning takes lots of energy, so healthy eating at lunch is important.</i></p> <p>We provide light meals (sandwiches, muffins and fruit) to students to see them through to the end of the day.</p>
1:30pm-2:25pm	Other subject	<p><i>Our children learn about the world beyond the school so that they can be successful.</i></p> <p>This time is used for a different learning area each day: art, health, Digital and Design Technologies, sport and library time.</p>
2:25-2:30pm	<p>Classroom pack up</p> <p>Green Slip raffle winners announced</p>	<p><i>Successful learners respect themselves, others and the environment.</i></p> <p>Classrooms are readied for the next day.</p> <p>Students earn 'green slips' throughout the day for Respecting Self (e.g. trying their best), Others (e.g. sharing with others) and the Environment (e.g. taking care of the class). These green slips are all entered into a daily raffle.</p> <p>Students, selected on good behaviours, are called to the office to choose at random and announce the winners to the school. Winners can earn something from the prize box, or an icy-pole.</p>
2:30pm	Final bell	<p><i>Successful learners are happy and enjoy school. We end the day in a good way, happy and looking forward to seeing each other the next day.</i></p> <p>Bus arrives. Students go home. All teachers come out of class to wave off the students and catch up with families.</p>

As a Department of Education school, the Wiluna Remote Community School follows the West Australian Curriculum;

- provides a Vocational Education Training in Schools (VETiS) program in Certificate I and II Conservation and Land Management courses with CRTAFE;
- provides a Bush Rangers program, which is youth-based conservation and community development program. This program aligns with the VETiS program.
- provides a nationally recognised Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM) program that combines the above programs to Martu ecological knowledge.
- reports on literacy and numeracy learning every semester;
- tracks learning data on all students in all learning areas;
- adheres to Department of Education guidelines and policies in all areas. This includes the Department's Strategic Plan for WA Public Schools 2016-2019 and other key strategic documents, all available on the Department of Education website.

Our School Council have declared 3 priorities that also guide the school direction: Health, Attendance and Language and Culture. The school and families have developed a Martu Calendar that allows the school to provide an engaging and contextually relevant STEM program with outcomes in education, training and employment.

The D'Orsogna Story

The 60 year old D'Orsogna business began as a family story more than 80 years ago when Luigi D'Orsogna travelled to the United States in 1926 to visit two of his brothers who'd migrated there four years earlier.

Italian-born Luigi and Concetta D'Orsogna had eight children: Antonietta (1914), Cesare (1917), Tommaso (1918), Giovanni (1920), Mario (1922), Pierino (1923), Rosa (1925) and Esterina (1926).

Luigi returned to Italy shortly after, understanding his small herd of 12 dairy cows could sustain him and his extended family better than working in the US. He heard from relatives in his village of "la nuova America", or the new America, as Australia was colloquially nicknamed and all the money that was to be made there.

Determined to migrate to Australia, Luigi did just that in October 1927, departing Italy for Australia aboard the ship Caprera and arriving in Fremantle on November 29. With the Great Depression starting to bite, he travelled from town to town looking for work, before starting in a granite quarry in Roleystone in 1929.

During the 1930s, Wiluna, in central Western Australia, was a thriving mining community with a population of more than 8000, of which 200-250 people were Italian. Hearing about Wiluna's prosperity, Luigi travelled there in 1931, finding work at Wiluna Gold Mines Limited.

After two years he had enough money to buy passage for two of his sons, Cesare aged 16 and Tommaso (Tom) aged 14, who arrived in Fremantle on September 12, 1933 aboard the ship Romolo.

The pair were greeted by Mr Casotti, owner of an Italian restaurant in James Street, Perth, as Luigi could not be at the port to welcome his sons and had made arrangements with Mr Casotti to accommodate the boys while they waited for a train to Wiluna. After a couple of days stay with Mr Casotti, the brothers started their journey to Wiluna.

When the brothers arrived in Wiluna, Luigi enrolled them at the local Catholic school, but they didn't remain there too long, with Cesare finding work at the Italian owned and operated Rome Bakery where he spent 15 months before joining his father at the mines at the age of 18.

Luigi, keen to find work for Tom, purchased a fruit and vegetable door to door business from a Greek friend and Tom worked this business for a while, but was inexperienced at the tender age of 15 and didn't understand the business, so it eventually went broke.

Luigi, with Tom by his side, then approached Jim Clarke, who managed Wiluna Meat Supply, about possible work for Tom. Mr Clarke said there was work at the abattoir 10km out of Wiluna for a man, but not for a boy of 15 years.

Luigi's persistence, however, convinced Mr Clarke to give Tom a chance to prove himself. Tom constantly asked Mr Clarke if there were any jobs at the butcher shop in town and eventually started in the smallgoods manufacturing factory adjacent to the Wiluna Meat Supply's Butcher shop, where he spent four years making Australian style sausages, frankfurters, polony, corned beef, pickled pork and dripping.

Effectively, this was the beginning of D'Orsogna Limited as it is known today.

Cesare, due for a holiday after three years mining at Wiluna, headed for Fremantle to greet another brother, Giovanni (John), who'd arrived in Fremantle on January 9, 1938, aboard the ship Remo. They both returned to Wiluna to join their father. Cesare, with four other Italian men, thought they'd try their hand at gold prospecting at Mt Vernon (120km east of Wiluna), after hearing of a great gold find.

Due to the shortage of work in 1939 at Wiluna Meat Supply, Tom finished there and joined his brother Cesare prospecting at Mt Vernon. Shortly after, Australia officially entered into World War II and during the next few years the D'Orsogna brothers were captured and interned, despite the fact that Tom, Cesare and John were Australian citizens at the time of their capture and subsequent internment.

After all three were released in August 1944, Cesare joined the merchant navy, John moved to Kalgoorlie to work at the Main Reef Hotel as a barman and Tom began work at Robbs Jetty, south of Fremantle, where he spent three years in the boning room, slaughtering area and cool rooms.

From there, Tom left for Melbourne in 1947 and found day time employment at Otto Wurth Pty Ltd, a continental smallgoods manufacturer in north Melbourne. In the evenings, he was employed at Café Latin, 206 Exhibition Street and Mario's Restaurant, 198 Exhibition Street Melbourne. His brother John also moved to Melbourne in 1947 to work at Café Latin.

After two productive years in Melbourne, Tom returned to Perth, having learnt enough about continental and Italian-style smallgoods and opened his own smallgoods business, T. D'Orsogna Family Butcher in Stone Street, West Perth in March 1949, marrying Maria Carello the same year.

John returned to Perth in May 1949, in partnership with Tom. Cesare, meanwhile, had left the merchant navy and made his way back to Australia in 1948, working as a waiter on the Orient Line of passenger ships. In 1951 Cesare became a partner as well and the name of the business was changed to D'Orsogna Brothers Pty Ltd.

Luigi returned permanently to Italy in 1951, after an absence of 24 years. On September 5 the same year, another D'Orsogna brother, Pierino, migrated to Australia aboard the ship Neptunia. As their business prospered, Tom and John involved themselves in many pursuits, sponsoring many cultural activities important to Italians. They established the D'Orsogna Cup in 1960, a soccer competition which helped establish and promote soccer in WA at a time when Australian Rules was the dominant football code. It was the state's premier soccer competition for more than 30 years.

John D'Orsogna developed the Italian Choir in Perth and later became a patron of the Western Australia Opera Company. While holidaying in Italy John met his future wife Diva. They married there and returned to Perth together in 1955.

Tom and John have each been awarded an Italian Cavalierato for their services to the Italian community in WA; Tom in 1967 and John in 1972.

D'Orsogna Smallgoods moved from West Perth to the corner of Leach Highway and Stock Roads, Palmyra in 1973. D'Orsogna products are now sold Australia wide.

This means at least 75% of members present, who are able to vote, must agree before the Directors can start the process of changing the Rule Book.

Proposed Special Resolution

At least 75% of the members present, and eligible to vote, agree as follows: the *Rule Book of the Marputu Aboriginal Corporation* (ICN: 8085) dated 16 December 2015 (**Current Rule Book**) be replaced by the *Replacement Rule Book of the Marputu Aboriginal Corporation* (ICN: 8085), as attached to this resolution, and for Central Desert to assist in providing all relevant document to ORIC, as required under section 69-20 of the *Corporations (Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander) Act 2006* (Cth) (**CATSI Act**) and rule 12.2.1 of the Current Rule Book.

This resolution was passed in accordance with Marputu's Current Rule Book and the CATSI Act.

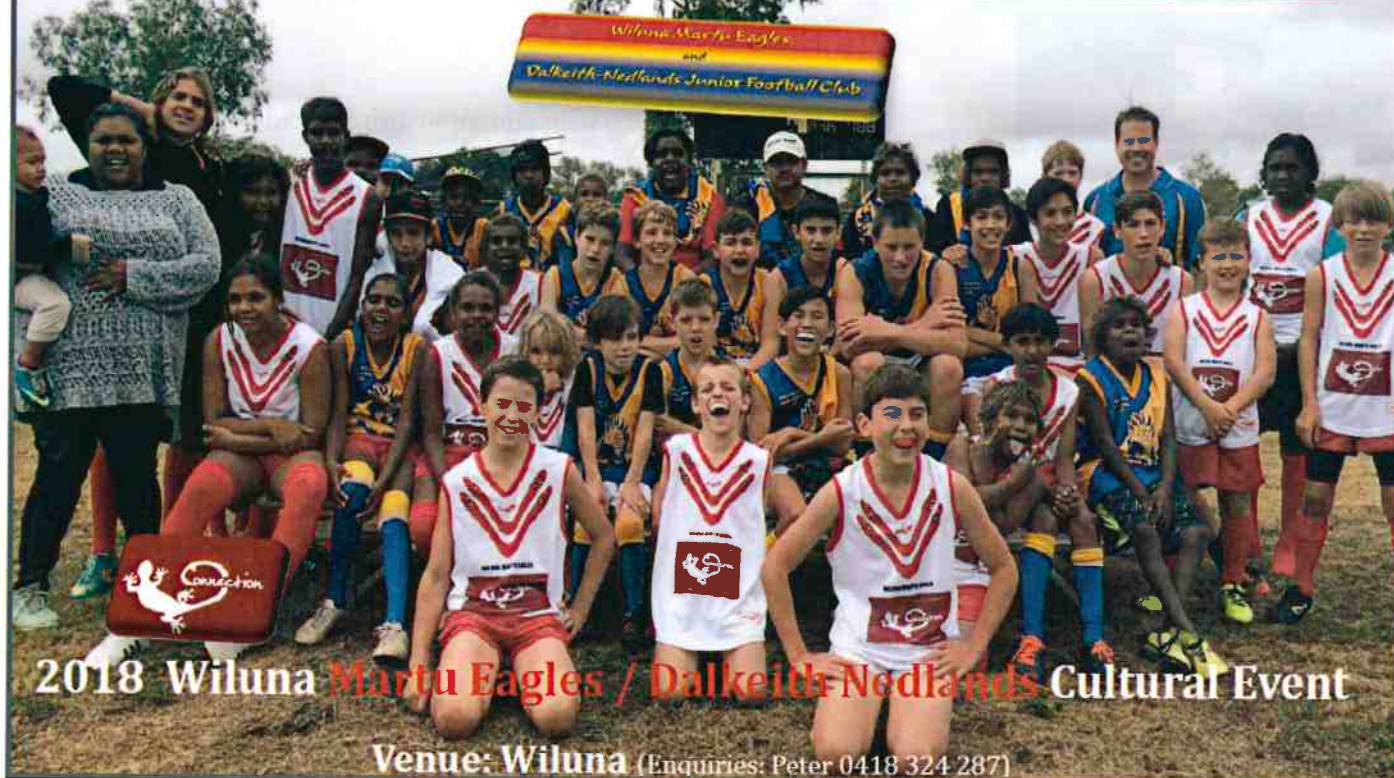

William Shakespeare Born and Died in April

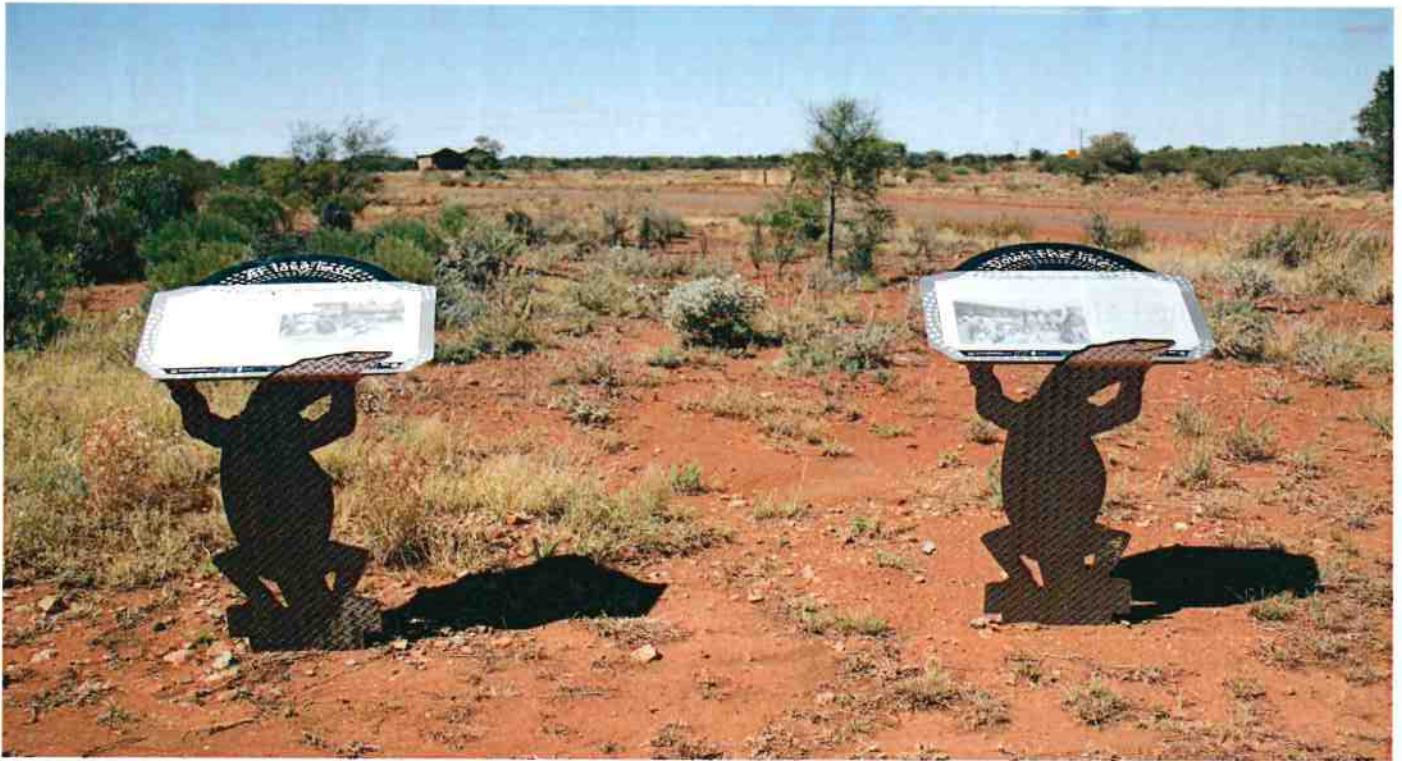

Things to see and do in Wiluna town

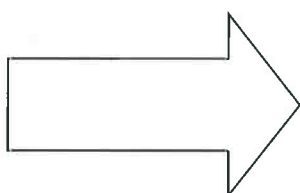
[Tjurkurba Art Gallery](#). See the display of historic photos and unique paintings by Wiluna's Aboriginal Martu artists who frequent the Gallery workshop, producing high quality paintings for sale.

- Check out the Last of the Nomads statue, the town's tribute to Warri (1909-1979) and Yatungka (1917-1979), believed to be the last desert nomads leading a traditional lifestyle. See Indigenous history for details.
- Take a walk around the graceful Old Hospital (now the Heritage & Interpretive Centre)) birthplace of many local Martu people - and former Governor-General, Major General Michael Jeffery.
- Red Hill Lookout. Just 1200 metres south of the town this rocky rise gives wonderful views over Wiluna across to the gold mine.
- Head out to the Clay Pans. After rains, these fill with water and are great for windsurfing, canoeing, bird watching and picnics.
- View the grave sites in the Pioneer Cemetery, dated from 1893 to 1903.
