

# **CEO's Report**

Council approved the Wiluna Caravan Park's Concept Plan at its June 2018 Ordinary Council Meeting. The Concept Plan was publicly advertised for community comment before Council approved the final plan. The next stage in the redevelopment is for the Shire to prepare a business plan which will include information on whether long-term tenants will be allowed to stay in the caravan park. The Shire can only allow a maximum of 30% of the sites to be used for long-term stay tenants. The current planning scheme places a limit on the maximum number of long-term stays sites that Council can approve in the tourist zone.

The Shire has cleared the caravan park site in preparation for major renovation works which are expected to occur in the 2019/20 financial year. The Shire will install a perimeter fence and gates and seek additional funding for this project in the 2018/19 financial year.

The Shire is committed to encouraging further economic development projects in Wiluna. The newly renovated Heritage and Interpretation Centre (former Hospital Building) should encourage more tourists to visit Wiluna, and when the caravan park is renovated, there will be accommodation options for them to stay in town.

There is also an opportunity for local indigenous residents to operate a culturally based business. There is a real appetite amongst tourists to experience the oldest culture in the world. The Shire has set aside office space in its Heritage and Interpretation Centre for an indigenous based business to operate so they can embrace this opportunity and promote Martu culture to the world.

The Shires' new Administration Centre is expected to be operational in July 2018. There will be an opportunity for locals and residents to view the building during the opening ceremony that is planned for the 6 September 2018.

## Rusted-on bias in unjust criticism of Council rates rise



Local Governments often bear the brunt of long-held misconceptions and never more so than around their annual rates increases.

Each year many including government, media and ratepayers look closely at the final figure of a Council's rates increase and often pass judgement on it using inappropriate yardsticks such as the Consumer Price Index.

A few weeks back, households awoke to a headline that Councils were being told to "rein in rate increases".

It would have been a fair demand to make but for the fact that Council rate increases were admirably low and far less than other government charges.

Accompanying the article was a table that listed the rate rises of 12 metropolitan Local Governments—the highest of which was 4% and the lowest under 1% - the average was slightly less than 2.5%.

In making the claim by the Opposition to rein in rates—the Minister was commendably more circumspect—the article ignorantly compared rate rises to inflation with CPI of 1.5%.

Further more, the article didn't mention a more relevant context—comparing Council rates increases to other charges by government that also directly affect households.

That is, the average 2.5% Council rate rise wasn't considered in light of the average 7% increase to electricity, 5.5% for water; 5.8% for car registration or 3.7% for motor licences.

Ironically the largest of all State Govnment increases this year is the 10% rise for the Emergency Services Levy that is collected via Council rate notices but does not go to Local Government.

Indeed, the State Government's own statements put the increase costs to households from the recent budget at 4.8%, which is less than the 6% average over the past decade.

Those numbers put the average 2.5% rise in Council rates in a much fairer context, especially when you consider that increases to utility charges such as electricity will contribute to the Council's costs.

But back to instead using inflation, or the CPI as a comparison. Whilst it may seem on the surface to be a fair comparison, it isn't. It is instead an argument that is easily understood but fatally flawed.

This factors that contribute to cost increases to Local Government, and as a consequence rates, are far more complex than comparing a cost-of-living basket of goods and services.

It is the same as saying that the price of bananas should only go up by CPI and not as a consequence of a myriad of factors including wages, cost of production and even climate.

It is hoped that ratepayers will recognise that an average Council rate rise of 2.5% is a positive achievement in an environment of much greater increases to other household charges.

Despite facing ongoing biases and misconception, Councils persevere in their efforts to meet community aspirations specific to their own context and for that, they are to be commended.



# WILUNA AERODROME EMERGENCY EXERCISE "TALK TO ME GOOSE"


It is a requirement under the Civil Aviation Safety Authority Manual of Standards 139 for Certified Aerodromes, such as the Wiluna Aerodrome, to conduct a full scale Emergency Exercise every two years. The purpose of this exercise is to establish how the Wiluna Aerodrome Emergency Procedures function in a simulated emergency event. Aerodrome Management Services had the privilege of planning and conduction the emergency exercise on behalf of the Shire of Wiluna.

The exercise took place at 4pm on the 31st May. We were extremely fortunate to experience a great turnout of emergency services personnel that were able to participate, namely Wiluna Police, Ngangganawili
Aboriginal Health Service, Wiluna Volunteer Bush Fire Brigade and the Matilda Mine Emergency
Response Team. We were also fortunate to have a representative from both the Department of Fire and
Emergency Services and Skipper Aviation to assist us as observers. A special thank you must go out to
the folks that volunteered to participate in the exercise as casualties, without your participation this type of
exercise would hardly be possible. We truly appreciate it. The stars of the exercise were undoubtedly the
volunteer students from the Wiluna Remote Community School. The did a tremendous job acting as
"casualties" and should be very proud of themselves. Representatives from all the emergency response
units spoke very highly of their acting abilities and performance and they appreciated all of their help.

At the end if the exercise a hot debrief was held for participants to discuss what worked really well during the exercise as well as where improvements could be made in the future. We believe the exercise was a success as it was a great opportunity to help prepare for a real emergency situation at the aerodrome. The day culminated in the Shire putting on a barbeque at the Heritage and Inperpretive Centre which was a great way to unwind after the day's events. Thank you to the Shire of Wiluna for putting on a great spread. Finally, Aerodrome Management Services, on behalf of the Shire of Wiluna, would like to thank the community of Wiluna for all your hospitality, participation and assistance in conducting this emergency exercise. It is much appreciated.

# Get ready for the new Child Care Subsidy From 2 July, the child care fee assistance your family receives will change.

From 2 July 2018, there will be a New Child Care Package. The Package will help parents with children aged 0 to 13 work, train, study and volunteer. The Package includes a new single Child Care Subsidy, which replaces the current Child Care Benefit and Child Care Rebate.

Transitioning to the new subsidy is <u>not</u> automatic and families need to complete a Child Care Subsidy assessment through myGov NOW by providing some new information and confirming their current details.

## What is the Child Care Subsidy?

The single new Child Care Subsidy replaces the current Child Care Rebate and Child Care Benefit. The subsidy will be paid directly to services.

There are also changes to the annual cap on the amount of child care parents can claim which will make child care more affordable for most families.

## What will happen if your assessment is not completed?

Transitioning to the new Child Care Subsidy from the two current payments (Child Care Rebate and Child Care Benefit) will not happen automatically.

Your family and little ones may not receive child care fee assistance if your assessment is not completed.

#### What do I need to do now?

You need to make sure you've completed your Child Care Subsidy assessment. This means going to your Centrelink online account via myGov and providing some new information and confirming your current details.

If you don't have a myGov account, you will need to create one at my.gov.au and link your Centrelink online account.

Please add in your own contact details if you are able to help parents and families to complete their assessment and transition to the new Subsidy.



# Saving the Life's of Country Dogs

A1 Wheatbelt Dog Rescue is a non for profit rescue organisation based in York. There aim is to save the lives of country dogs. They receive dogs from local government pounds. The dogs are assessed and if required are examined by a fully qualified animal behaviourist who gives them advise on matching the dog with the most suited family.

This non for profit rescue organisation was the brain child of Matthew Sharpe a former council ranger who decided that re-homing was a better option than them being destroyed.

Matt worked for the Shire of York and saw hundreds of dogs in the country being euthanized because their owners had not claimed them and new homes could not be found. He started taking dogs to a local rescue organisation which unfortunately closed, so he decided to start his own non for profit rescue group.

He now provides ranger services for 35 Regional Shires with the help of a dedicated team from Ravensthorpe to Wiluna and across to Southern Cross. In Matt's spare time he is flat out providing care and rehabilitation for the rescue dogs and finding them new homes.

A1 Wheatbelt Dog Rescue will take cats and kittens, but they are passed along to Safe who will provide care until a forever home is found.

Jodie a dedicated member of Matt's WA Contract Ranger Services team comes to Wiluna once a month and she has currently taken approximately 80 dogs and pups out of town to be rehomed. Jodie has return 10 dogs to the town, that have been sterilised, vaccinated, treated for worms, ticks and fleas and they are now registered at the Shire. 4 cats have been surrendered and they were transferred to Safe.

To all the kind, generous members of the Community who have surrendered animals, they say thank you, because they are now either in or on there way to finding their forever home.

Wiluna dance practice kicked off at 4.30pm on the 12 June with 12 children attending, 4 boys and 8 girls. Linaire and I started the session with the Bus Stop. It was a good first training and I was very impressed by the fact that the children stuck at the task put in front of them. There will be a break over the school holidays, and dance practice will pick up again during the first week back at school, so come on down and take part or see what the dance crew are doing.








# Wiluna Remote Community School (WRCS) Training Centre

At WRCS, we take learning *on country* to bring together traditional ecological knowledge and the school curriculum outcomes. We run the Cadets WA Bush Ranger program, which counts towards the student's WA Certificate of Education. In the week beginning the 18th June, Science Pathways Coordinator David Broun travelled with high school and VET students and staff to Milyiniri (Well 6) on the Canning Stock Route. Dave facilitated two-way Science activities including Martu knowledge videos and a two-way habitat investigation.

#### Martu knowledge videos

Adults and students worked together to make short videos that explain elements of Martu ecological knowledge. Sidney Hodder filmed Stewart Long explaining how shields were made from Jara Putal (beefwood tree), Miranda and Keshaya Long made a video about locating, digging and cooking Lunki (witchetty grub). One Lunki was eaten raw by Lena Long, however everyone else waited for them to cook in the coals. Stewart Gilbert made a video of his father Stewart Long showing how to use woolybutt grass to make kirti (glue). Anthea Cutter and Miranda Long made a video showing how to use grinding stones found at a large camp used by Martu in the old days. Ronald Harris made a video about tracking Marlu. Keshaun Gilbert made a heartfelt video about the trip to Well 7 to mark the place where Lena, his nanna, was born. Students will enter

some of these videos into a one minute file competition - Good Luck!

## Two-way habitat investigation

Lena and Stewart took students to parata country (sandy spinifex plain). They led a tracking exercise where students recorded data in a tracking sheet about the evidence of animals (scat, tracks and diggings) that they found. Evidence of native animals included marlu (kangaroo), patata (turkey), parnka (goanna), pala pala (small lizard), karlaya (emu), snake and hopping mouse. Feral animal tracks included cat, camel and cattle. Stewart and Lena then identified important plants in the area and students took photo's and recorded data in eBooks using iPads. Students then captured invertebrates. Invertebrates are animals without a backbone such as insects, worms and spiders. They identified these using field guides and digital microscopes. The results were surprising with 8 different invertebrates found including maru maru (antlion), spiders, praying mantis and minga (ants).

The Milyiniri trip showcased the opportunities that education in a community like Wiluna can provide. Students in the city don't have access to important culture and county that Wiluna students do. At Milyiniri adults and students worked together on activities which is a wonderful way to connect families, school and community and for everyone to share in the wonder and joy of education in Wiluna. ## More about Science Pathways

Science Pathways for Indigenous Communities is part of the CSIRO Indigenous STEM Education project funded by BHP Billiton Foundation. Science Pathways has been working with Wiluna Remote Community School since March 2016. Science Pathways aims to connect Indigenous ecological knowledge with Western science and support schools to develop an integrated two-way science learning program. Since 2016 Science Pathways has facilitated two-way science activities, workshops for teachers and community, and has supported the school in it's plan to use the Wiluna Martu calendar to guide the learning program.

1 Cup Pancakes

These are the easiest pancakes to make - you don't even need scales to weight your ingredients. All you need is ONE cup or a mug. As long as you use the same cup for measuring both the flour and the milk, you'll be laughing!

# Ingredients

- 1 Egg
- 1 Cup Self-Raising Flour
- 1 Cup of Milk
- 1 Pinch of Salt



# Method

- 1. To make the batter, crack the egg into a large mixing bowl.
- 2. Add the flour, milk and a pinch of salt.
- 3. Whisk everything together until you have a lovely, smooth batter.
- 4. Put a large frying pan on a medium heat and after a minute or so add 1/2 tablespoon of oil.
- 5. Carefully tilt the pan to spread the oil out evenly
- 6. Add a few ladles of batter to the pan, leaving enough space between each one so they have room to spread out slightly. Each ladleful will make one pancake, and you'll need to cook them in batches.
- 7. Cook the pancakes for 1 to 2 minutes, or until little bubbles appear on the surface and the bases are golden, then use a spatula to carefully flip them over.
- 8. When the pancakes are golden on both sides, use spatula to transfer the pancakes to a plate.
- 9. Repeat with the remaining batter, adding 1/2 tablespoon of oil to the pan between batches, if needed.
- 10. Serve the pancakes straight away, topped with your choice of natural yoghurt, cream and some berries or banana.

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


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
