Proposal to Borrow

Establishment of Overdraft Facility to meet shortterm cashflow requirements

Notice is hereby given that the Shire of Wiluna proposes to establish an overdraft facility for \$2.5M with Commonwealth Bank of Australia to fund short-term cash-flow deficiencies arising from the slow processing of recoup claims for government-funded road works.

The facility will only be drawn down as required to meet cashflow requirements arising from the need to pay contractors in advance of lodging recoup claims with Main Roads WA, and any borrowing through this facility is therefore expected to be quite short-term in nature.

The borrowing will be at the bank's ruling rate at the time any funds are drawn.

One month's public notice of this proposal is given as required by section 6.20 of the Local Government Act 1995.

Carbon Farming

An information session on carbon farming, organised by Marilyn Bernhardt (Youno Downs Station), was held in the Moonlight Hall on Wednesday 1st May.

It was well attended by pastoralists from across the Wiluna shire along with a representative from Jundee Mine. Vince Catania, MLA, Nationals member for the NW Central District was also in attendance for a time.

The workshop was conducted by Kent Broad and Harley Lacy, of 'Outback Carbon Pty Ltd'. Both have lived on stations with Harley's family having a long history of owning pastoral leases in the Meekatharra area, which continues to the present day. Kent and his family spent time on Beringarra Station out of Meekatharra.

Due to a slight mix-up with the time schedule their presentation was a little briefer than they would have preferred but a huge amount of information was presented to the group. There were many questions asked as this was the first opportunity many people had had to really get a grasp on what carbon farming in the rangelands is actually about and how it would work.

Most people felt they would need a lot more time to process the information before deciding if it was something they wanted to get into. For some being locked into a contract for 25 years was an idea they weren't all that comfortable with.

Only time will tell what the future holds for our rangelands and whether carbon farming is an option people will choose to take up or not.

Thanks to Marilyn for initiating the information session and to Kent and Harley for coming up to present it.

When pastoralists travel to anything it's always worthwhile trying to fit in as many learning opportunities as possible so following a delicious lunch, Michelle Donaldson, CEO of the Nullarbor Regional Biosecurity Association, arrived along with dogger for the Nullarbor region, Teen Ryan.

Teen demonstrated setting of a dingo trap using a new, smaller type of trap now available. Anyone driving past would have been intrigued by the sight of a group of men and women standing on the median strip, watching a young woman digging in the gravel!!

Following the demonstration, the group moved back to the hall to hold a robust discussion about the issue of dogs in the Wiluna pastoral region and the best ways to deal with them. Topics such as employing a dogger, funding for same, baiting, aerial baiting and culling of feral animals were covered. At the end of the discussion people were happy that some constructive ideas had come about and that there was a way to move forward.

With so much food left over people were plied with dishes of sandwiches, wraps and cake, before heading on the trip home.

NORTHERN STAR RESOURCES OPERATIONS UPDATE - MAY 2019

In January 2019, Northern Star was granted approval to commence mining at the Ramone Open Pit project. Ramone is located 40km south of the Jundee Mine Site. The open pit has a mine life of approximately 18 months and will supplement the underground ore currently mined from the Jundee Operations.

Please note that a portion of the Ramone ore is currently being transported to the Blackham Resources Matilda Mine for processing. The road trains and road maintenance equipment will be accessing the Jundee-Wiluna Road in the short term. Please take care when driving on this road.

The history of Mother's Day in Australia How gift giving started.

Whilst the tradition of giving gifts on Mother's Day was well established in the United States (1908) it didn't begin in Australia until 1924.

In 1923, the late Mrs Janet Heyden was a pioneer of Australian Mother's Days. Mrs Heyden's concern over lonely, forgotten aged Mothers in Sydney's Newington State Hospital, where she visited an old friend regularly, started a campaign throughout the city for donations to buy presents for these old ladies. Newspapers carried her appeals, while she made personal requests to many of Sydney's leading business houses.

The response amounted to a ton of donations, which were stored in the Sydney Feminist Club. They ranged from talcum powder and soap to knitted scarves and mittens. Confectionery manufacturers, leading firms and the Sydney Fruit Markets all contributed towards Mrs Hayden's gifts for 'her' lonely mothers.

Mrs Hayden also visited many Sydney schools, asking the pupils for help. "I wanted 10in x 12in bags with double draw-strings", were her instructions and the pupils from some of these schools made more than 200 of them - and filled every one for her.

Although her original idea was directed towards mothers, Mrs Heyden's sympathy extended to old and neglected fathers too. With surplus bags she was also a pioneer of Father's Day. Her appeals continued regularly during the following years, while the show windows of retail stores all over the nation took up the idea.

Every since her first appeal in 1923, she visited the lonely and forgotten mothers in Newington, until her death in 1960 with gifts and bunches of Chrysanthemums.

It is said that Mrs Heyden was disappointed by the commercialism of Mother's Day and the lose of the original meaning, but she, nevertheless considered that this commercialism would do more good than harm - because commercial interest provided publicity which reminded people of the occasion.

Every year thereafter, Mrs Heyden raised increasing support for the project from local businesses and even the local Mayor. The day has since become commercialised. Traditionally, the Chrysanthemum is given to mothers for Mother's Day as the flower is naturally in season during May (autumn in Australia). Men will often wear a Chrysanthemum in their lapels in honour of mothers.







On the 14th of September in 1959, the very first School of the Air for WA broadcast its first air lesson from the Royal Flying Doctor base in Meekatharra. A total of 27 children came on air. Since then it has educated over 1230 pupils and reached over 160 locations across Western Australia

The school has a rich history in the Wiluna shire, giving remote kids a good education and most importantly the chance to feel part of a community despite their isolated circumstances.

To celebrate this great milestone, the school P&C are having a fundraiser of workshirts with the school logo embroidered above the left pocket. The shirts will be supplied by Julie Walsh (ex student) And owner of Topp Dogg in Moora.

They are available in three colours, half button or full. Adults are \$45 and kids sizes are \$30.


Murdoch University Outreach De-sexing Program

The partnership between the Wiluna Martu Eagles and the Dalkeith Nedlands Junior Football Club has strengthened over the years into a mutually respectful rivalry, producing some thrilling football games and many lasting friendships.

Murlpirrmarra Connection Ltd

Murlpirrmarra Connection is a not-forprofit organisation focused on providing Wiluna, Leonora and Murchison based Aboriginal youth with access to quality secondary education options.

From 2010 Murlpirrmarra Connection has grown from managing three teenage boys to now supporting 114 young men and women. This includes 65 school aged students, 16 post graduate students and 21 young people who have left school.

Our organisation was established in response to the number of young Aboriginal men and women in these areas who have limited educational options; who are falling through the cracks; or who are already involved in the juvenile justice system.

Murlpirrmarra Connection offers a positive support system to provide these students with hope and to avoid the pitfalls that can derail their lives. We are committed to supporting students to complete school and to engage in higher education, vocational training and employment.

Real Night Parrots (Night Parrot Recovery Team March 2019)

The recent independent investigation into a number of night parrot sightings has revealed that several purported records of Night Parrots lacked veracity. After the findings of the investigation were made public, scientists conducting vital ecological research on Night Parrots have expressed concerns that their work may be tarred with the same brush, so to speak.

To address their concerns that confusion over all Night Parrot sightings may sully the results of their research, the Night Parrott Recovery Team has sought to clarify the situation regarding what has been referred to as "Australia's most mysterious bird".

After the investigation's findings were released, reports of Night Parrots from three sites (Diamantina National Park, Goneaway National Park in Western Queensland and Kalamurina Sanctuary in Norther South Australia) were retracted.

However, it should be emphasised that the original 2013 records from Pullen Pullen in Queensland and records from a number of undisclosed sites in Western Australia are NOT IN QUESTION and are considered genuine records of Night Parrots.

Following an independent investigation into the validity of some recent records of Night Parrot occurrence and nesting, the Australian Wildlife Conservancy (AWC) has taken the step of retracting all records of the Night Parrot that it has published. However, the Night Parrot Recovery Team (NPRT) notes that in the aftermath of the release of the independent investigation there has been some confusion as to what the results of the investigation truly mean. In relation to these sites and records, NPRT wishes to make the following clear.

Sites/studies NOT IN QUESTION in this process:

- Original occurrence reports from Pullen Pullen by John Young and Steve Murphy, later observations by Steve Murphy and colleagues, and data gathered by Nick Leseberg (UQ) (with many verifiable recordings, plus some photographs).
- Western Australian sites for which the precise location details are still confidential.

Records from three sites HAVE BEEN RETRACTED from all on-line and paper-based literature:

- Diamantina National Park (some nest records are in question, calls heard by John Young in the presence of other competent observers are probably Night Parrots, but they await analysis of independently verifiable recordings)
- Goneaway National Park (unconfirmed reports of Night Parrot calls)
- AWC's Kalamurina Sanctuary in northern South Australia (feather and calls in doubt; photograph inconclusive.

Once home to the most advanced civilization on Earth, the city of Atlantis is now an underwater kingdom ruled by the power hungry King Orm. Individuals eligible to receive 2019 National Immunisation Program funded influenza vaccines

- pregnant women at any stage of pregnancy
- people aged 65 years and over
- Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people aged six months and over
- people aged ≥6 months with medical conditions putting them at increased risk of severe influenza and complications.

Important Information prior to vaccination

- Before administering an influenza vaccine, CHECK you have the correct vaccine for the person's age. Ages are identified on the syringe.
- Children aged ≥6 months to <9 years require two doses of influenza vaccine (given at least 4 weeks apart) in the first year they receive the vaccine. One annual dose of influenza vaccine is required in following years even if only one dose was given in the first year.

INFORMATION FOR CONSUMERS IN 2019

- Vaccination is the most effective way of reducing the impact of influenza in the community.
- To protect yourself from influenza, you should get vaccinated every year. The influenza virus is always changing so the influenza vaccine changes too.
- The influenza vaccine is recommended for anyone aged 6 months and over and is provided free for those most at risk from influenza and its complications.
- Getting the vaccine from April will protect you before the peak flu period, from around June to September, in most parts of Australia.
- Let your immunisation provider know your age or the age of your child before getting the influenza vaccine. The brand of influenza vaccine you get depends on your age.
- The influenza vaccine does not contain any live virus, so you cannot get influenza from the vaccine.

What is influenza?

Influenza is caused by a virus that can infect your nose, throat and sometimes lungs. It spreads easily from person to person through coughing, sneezing and close contact, such as kissing and sharing food and drinks.

Influenza symptoms such as fever, headache, tiredness and muscle aches can start suddenly. Elderly people might also experience confusion and children might also get irritable and an upset stomach. Symptoms can last for a week or more. When severe, complications such as pneumonia and worsening of existing medical conditions can lead to hospitalisation and sometimes death.

Why should I get the influenza vaccine?

Vaccination experts recommend that everyone six months and over get vaccinated to reduce their chance of getting influenza.

Every year the influenza vaccine changes to match the influenza virus that is most likely to be around during the influenza season. Getting vaccinated every year is the best way of preventing influenza and its complications.

There is emerging evidence that the influenza vaccine gives the most protection within the first three to four months after it is given. It's important to make sure you are protected in time for when influenza is most common, from around June to September, in most parts of Australia.

When should I get the influenza vaccine?

Free influenza vaccines under the National Immunisation Program are available from your vaccination provider from April 2019. Getting vaccinated from April gives you and your children the best protection ready for the peak influenza period, from around June to September, in most parts of Australia.

Who is eligible for the free influenza vaccine under the National Immunisation Program?

The vaccine is free under the National Immunisation Program for people who are most likely to be affected by complications from influenza. This includes:

People 65 years and over

Older people aged 65 years and over are more likely to be affected by complications associated with seasonal influenza.

Pregnant women

Pregnant women are more likely to be affected by complications associated with influenza. Experts from the Australian Technical Advisory Group on Immunisation recommend vaccinating against influenza at any stage during pregnancy, and preferably before the Influenza season starts. The influenza vaccine given in pregnancy protects pregnant women and their babies during their first months of life when babies are most likely to be seriously affected by Influenza and are too young to get vaccinated themselves.

Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people

Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people can get the influenza vaccine for free from six months of age.

People with certain medical conditions

People with some existing medical conditions are more likely to have complications from influenza and are eligible for a free influenza vaccine. This includes anyone who is six months of age and over who has:

- heart disease
- severe asthma (requiring frequent medical consultations or use of multiple medications)
- chronic lung conditions
- diseases of the nervous system which affect your breathing
- impaired immunity
- diabetes
- kidney disease
- haemoglobinopathies
- children aged six months to 10 years on long-term aspirin therapy.

If you are not sure if these categories apply to you or your child, speak to your immunisation provider.

Some states and territories are funding free influenza vaccines for children aged six months to less than five years. Talk to your immunisation provider or local state or territory health department for more information.

You can also buy an influenza vaccine if you are not eligible to got a vaccine for free. Speak to your immunisation provider for more information.

Where can I get the influenza vaccine?

You can get the influenza vaccine from a range of immunisation providers which can include general practices (your family GP), community health clinics, Aboriginal Medical Services, and others. Talk to your immunisation provider to arrange your influenza vaccine.

Influenza vaccines for people aged 65 years and over

A specific influenza vaccine is available to provide better protection for people aged 65 years and over.

If you are aged 65 years or over, speak to your immunisation provider to find out more about receiving the specific influenza vaccine. This specific influenza vaccine cannot be given to people aged under 65 years.

Influenza vaccines for children

All influenza vaccines are age-specific. Let your immunisation provider know the age of your child before they get their influenza vaccine. This will make sure they receive the correct dose and brand.

If your child is aged six months to less than nine years and has never had the influenza vaccine before, experts recommend they have two doses of influenza vaccine (given at least 4 weeks apart) in the first year they receive the vaccine. After that only one influenza vaccine dose is needed each year. It is safe to receive the influenza vaccine with other routine childhood vaccines. When a child receives the influenza vaccine and pneumococcal vaccine (Prevenar 13*) together, they may be more likely to develop a fever. Speak to your immunisation provider if you have any concerns.

Influenza vaccine safety

Some people might experience side effects within one to two days after influenza vaccination. These include soreness, redness, discomfort and swelling at the injection site, tiredness, muscle aches and low fever. These side effects are usually mild and go away within a few days without any treatment.

The influenza vaccine is safe for pregnant women and their unborn babies at any stage during pregnancy and is recommended.

It is safe for people with an egg allergy to have influenza vaccines.

People with a history of serious allergic reactions (anaphylaxis) to egg should receive their influenza vaccine in a medical facility with staff experienced in recognising and treating anaphylaxis.

If you have experienced any of the following talk to your immunisation provider before getting an influenza vaccine:

- a serious allergic reaction (anaphylaxis) following a previous influenza vaccination
- a serious allergic reaction (anaphylaxis) to any influenza vaccine ingredient.

You are encouraged to report any concerning event following influenza vaccination to:

- your immunisation provider
- pharmacists from NPS MedicineWise on 1300 134 237
- state or territory health departments, or
- the Therapeutic Goods Administration (TGA) through the 'Safety information' link on the TGA website.

Other ways to stop the spread of influenza:

- Washing your hands regularly preferably with soap and water before and after contact with others, and before handling food. Alternatively, use alcohol-based hand rub.
- Covering your nose and mouth with tissues or your elbow when you sneeze or cough.
 Make sure you throw tissues away and perform hand hygiene immediately afterwards.
- Not sharing personal items such as cups, plates and cutlery.
- Staying at home when you are sick.

Chicken & Mushroom Pie



Ingredients

500 grams of Chicken Breast or Thigh 300g sliced Mushrooms 200g Cream Cheese 2 Sheets of frozen puff pastry 300g fresh broccoli 400g carrots Half a cabbage 1 teaspoon dried parsley 1 teaspoon minced garlic A dash of oilive oil A dash of milk Salt, black pepper

- 1. Preheat the oven to 200 c (108 c fan forced).
- 2. Chop the chicken into pieces and brown in pan, add mushrooms and then soft cheese parsley and some black pepper—cook stirring until the cheese melts. Transfer the mixture to a oven proof pie dish.






